¹ The legal entity *International Society for Military Law and the Law of War* or *Société Internationale de Droit Militaire et de Droit de la Guerre* is an International Non-profit-making Association (AISBL) under Belgian law. The Society has its seat (as well as its Secretariat) in Brussels since 1988, when it was created to succeed an international society with the same name and established in Strasbourg in 1956. In short, the objective the Society has set itself is to study and disseminate military law, international humanitarian law and the law of peace operations. To this end, the Society regularly organizes congresses and seminars (in various countries). Also, under the auspices of the Society, the specialised review the *Military Law and the Law of War Review* or *Revue de Droit Militaire et de Droit de la Guerre* is published. Moreover, the Society has a Documentation Centre at its disposal. The Society has many hundreds of members spread over a variety of countries from all over the world and, in addition, constitutes an umbrella organisation for 22 National Groups, which are separate entities and which, in 22 different countries, have the same objective as the one pursued by the Society and organize their own activities.
