

Franklin D. Rosenblatt is the President of the Criminal and Disciplinary Law Committee of the International Society for Military Law and the Law of War. He has been active in ISMLLW since 2014.

Frank is an Assistant Professor at Mississippi College School of Law in Jackson, Mississippi in the United States. His research interests are criminal law, evidence, international criminal law, military justice, and the existence of a trial penalty for those who plead not guilty to criminal charges. He is the director of the law school's Litigation and Dispute Resolution Center.

Prior to becoming a law professor, Frank served in the U.S. Army JAG Corps and retired in the rank of Lieutenant Colonel. He served in four of the Army's combat divisions and two joint special operations units.

As a JAG he served as a prosecutor, legal advisor, and defense counsel. He served as the lead military defense counsel for Sergeant Bowe Bergdahl in the most publicized court-martial in American history.

Between his military service and his law professorship, Frank served as a judicial law clerk for the Honorable Barbara J. Rothstein in Washington, D.C., and as a commercial litigation attorney for Butler Snow, LLP, in Ridgeland, Mississippi.

Frank has co-authored three books and numerous articles on military justice. He has received national recognition for his legal writing, numerous military awards and citations, and is the 2021 recipient of a Mississippi bar association award for his *pro bono* work on behalf of Mississippi inmates who received life sentences for acts committed as juveniles.

Frank serves on the Board of Directors of the National Institute of Military Justice. He is an Advisory Director for the University of Chicago – Kent College of Law's Center for National Security and Human Rights Law. He is also a Court of Appeals judge for the Mississippi Army National Guard.
